Parenting Rights/Procedural Safeguards

Parent participation in all decisions

- ★ As a parent, you have the right to approve or veto all recommendations made by CDC staff
- ★ NOTHING can be done (or stopped) without your written consent
- ★ Written consent can be revoked at any time



Appropriate Evaluation

- ★ Evaluators must be knowledgeable and trained
- ★ A variety of instruments and procedures must be used
- ★ Tests must take into account cultural and racial differences

<u>Individualized Family Service Plan</u>

★ A written statement for your child that is developed, reviewed and revised by the whole IFSP team (which includes the child's parents)

Parent rights include

- ★ Written notice: you will receive written notice of all changes on your child's plan
- ★ Parent permission: you must sign permission for all services to be implemented. Parents have the right to revoke consent at any time.
- ★ Confidentiality: Your child's records are confidential and can be accessed only by yourself, staff members and state officials
- ★ Location of services; All services must be provided in the least restrictive environment (which is usually your home)
- ★ Conflict Resolution: There are agencies and safeguards in place to provide you with assistance if you and the CDC cannot agree on the best services for your child.
